In 1961 a group of Pasadena mothers believed their special needs children deserved quality care and education. So they founded one of the first schools in Los Angeles County for children with Down syndrome, who were brought out of seclusion and into the light.

Through the years the school gained widespread community support and in 1966 the organization was named Villa Esperanza, meaning House of Hope. As the children grew, Villa established a continuum of care to include a speech and language center, occupational therapy clinic, behavioral services, adult residential, employment services, day programs and additional locations in Ventura County.

All along, Villa Esperanza Services has remained true to its mission of providing love, care and hope for individuals with developmental disabilities and their families.

Yet the physical campus has not kept up with these remarkable strides. To sustain our position of leadership in the field of human services, the campus must be expanded and modernized so we can meet every need in spacious, innovative and welcoming surroundings that will stand the test of time. We also must find a property to purchase that will house our adult program that is currently offered in cramped, leased space.

And so we are embarking on a new type of partnership with individuals, corporations and foundations that have the courage to join us in dreaming big and doing more.

hope transforms

Our new school for children, teens and young adults will be in boundless space, inside and out, built in phases to ensure that services are not interrupted. Enrollment capacity will increase to 120.

The Dimensions program for 70 adults will be in a dedicated building purchased and renovated by Villa to ensure that social activities, employment training and transition programs can be provided in an atmosphere conducive to highest expectations. A continuum of care will be available as clients age from high school to adulthood and into their senior years.

A Phased Approach

Imagine Villa Esperanza's vibrant new areas, with construction and renovation completed over the next several years. This way, regular programming will not be disrupted and clients will continue to thrive as the properties go through a remarkable transformation.

Phase 1 will include seven classrooms for Villa's School, each designed for 12 students and equipped with an instruction support area and one-on-one study area. Beautifully landscaped gardens will serve as restful retreats for clients and staff. Children and teens will play and enjoy free time in new outdoor recreational areas. And the new facility for the Dimensions Adult Day Program will be purchased and renovated.

During **Phase 2**, three more Villa School classrooms will increase enrollment by nearly 40 percent. Specialized quarters will be built for occupational, behavioral, speech and language therapies. A halfgymnasium will double as a multipurpose room to provide flexible space for sports and special activities, and a new lunchroom and kitchen will be in constant use. There will be ample meeting space for staff, clients and the community. Administrative offices will be located over a parking structure that will accommodate 75 vehicles. With the help of our donors, this phased approach will enable Villa to fulfill the vision everyone has imagined.
